How to Access Transportation to Work When You Receive iBudget Services

“To advocate and promote meaningful participation in all aspects of life for Floridians with developmental disabilities”

If you have a paid job in the community, you want to be on time for work every day.

If you have your own car and are able to drive, if you are able to ride public transportation, or if you have a reliable friend or family member that will drive you to and from work, you cannot use your iBudget to pay for transportation to and from work.

If none of those transportation options are good for you, you may be able to use your iBudget Waiver services to pay for your transportation to and from work. The iBudget Waiver will only pay for transportation to and from a paid job in the community if you receive Life Skills Development Level 2 - Supported Employment services and they are included in your Support Plan and Cost Plan.

Even if you have a job, you may need Supported Employment services to help you keep your job something changes. It's a good idea to have a few Life Skills Development Level 2 - Supported Employment hours in your Support Plan and in your Cost Plan. If you receive these services you are eligible to use your iBudget to get Transportation Services to and from work. Your Support Coordinator can assist you with this.
